





- 4) This graph shows the percent of students meeting grade level benchmarks on CMAS 9, PSAT 9, PSAT 10, or SAT in Math and Evidence Based Reading and Writing (EBRW). Data is aggregated across years and grades to match SPF reporting. The SPF "Meets Expectations" benchmark is at least 15% of students in Literacy and 6% in Math. Note that the percent and count of students takes into account participation rates.
- 5) This graph shows the median growth percentile (MGP) for students on CMAS 9, PSAT 9, PSAT 10, and SAT in both Math and Evidence Based Reading and Writing (EBRW). Data is aggregated across grades and years to match SPF reporting. The SPF "Meets Expectations" benchmark is an MGP at least 50 in each subject.
- 6) This table shows the school's performance on four engagement and post-secondary measures. The 2018 District SPF "Meets Expectations" benchmarks are:
  - a) Attendance: at least 86.2% b) Truancy: less than 7.7%
  - c) Attendance Improvement: at least 75%
  - d) Completion Rate: at least 55.4%
  - e) Dropout Rate: less than 11.4%


