Why District Authorizers?

- They are the entities that do most of the authorizing
- They need support, but their individual needs may be different
- They are too-often misunderstood and over-simplified

District Authorizers are the Norm Nationally

- Established by law in 33 charter states
- > 90 percent of all authorizers are districts
- Districts oversee 53 percent of charter schools
- Also more than half of large authorizers

Impact on the Sector

Tri-State Alliance states represent:

- > 41 percent of the nation's authorizers
- > 30 percent of the nation's charter schools

Project Goals

- Strengthen authorizing states with district authorizers
 - 2 Educate districts and stakeholders about authorizing responsibilities
 - Engage and provide support to more authorizers in CA, CO, and FL
 - Support states outside the Tri-State Alliance

Strengthen authorizing in states with predominately district authorizers.

Educate districts and other key stakeholders about districts' ongoing authorizing and oversight responsibilities under state law:

- As an effective way to expand options for all students
- Thereby improving access and services for disadvantaged students, students with disabilities, and English Learners

Engage and provide support to a larger proportion of district authorizers in Colorado, Florida, and California, including:

- > Small and rural districts
- Districts authorizing charter schools with:
 - low performance or
 - problems with academics, finance, governance, or operations

Support states outside the Tri-State Alliance that seek to establish statewide associations for charter authorizers.

Most Work is Housed with Our Partners

Most funding passed through to CCAP; CACSA; and FACSA

- CACSA is currently funded as a project of CSI because of informal status
- FACSA and CCAP are incorporated entities capable of contracting with CSI

Expand state groups to influence and support more authorizers in each state

- Engage districts not yet involved in state-based groups
- Specialized programs for rural and small districts
- ▶ Focus on helping districts that authorize struggling charter schools

Create Material

- ► Each state partner assemble a wish list of documents and material
- Compare across states for efficiency
- Create model materials based on each state's needs
- Cross-state sharing to accelerate and increase range of materials available

Host Convenings

- Each state association to hold inperson and remote meetings
- Focused meetings with small and rural authorizers
- Peer-to-peer networking and outreach
- > Annual national meeting of all partners

Expand Access and Improve Services for All Students

- Focus on district-level practices that ensure access and quality services for all students, including:
 - Students with disabilities
 - English learners
